

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING

Please order early, enclosing payment. U.S. and foreign customers may remit in Canadian funds. We provide a phytosanitary certificate for export purposes, and if your country requires an import permit to accompany the bulbs, please forward this to us well in advance of your delivery date.

We ship prepaid parcel post all orders of \$130.00 or more. Orders under this amount must include \$3.00 extra to cover postage and handling costs. We also ship Air Mail if requested to do so, and will bill you the extra cost at time of shipment. We do not have access to the UPS system in the U.S.A., sorry.

Shipping season is from early September for peonies, and from late September through October for lilies. Iris and the minor bulbs are shipped in late August.

OUR GUARANTEE

We guarantee safe delivery of all stock, and we will cheerfully replace all material not received in good condition, or that proves not true to variety.

CULTURAL INSTRUCTIONS

All lilies do well in a well-drained, sunny location. They adapt to a variety of soils, but care must be taken if planting them in heavy clays to provide for proper drainage. A handful of sharp gravel at the bottom of each planting hole will ensure the bulb will not sit in water. This will prevent basal and root rots, the cause of many losses in such soils.

Lilies do best in full sun locations, but will perform reasonably well with half day of shade. If these half day regimes are employed, it is best to locate them where they receive afternoon sunlight. This will help them pass into night with no extra moisture on the foliage. Lilies going into night with wet leaves are courting danger. Such conditions are ideal for infection of botrytis. This fungus disease is particularly destructive in wet and humid climate. Fungicides are relatively effective controls and hybridizers are continuing their work breeding resistant varieties. Specifically ask for such varieties and you will have better success.

Lilies will benefit from the incorporation of bone meal, annually applied as a top dressing and worked into the top few centimeters of soil. Nitrogen fertilizers will also enhance foliage growth and colour, but care must be taken to avoid growth that is too lush. This is an open invitation for botrytis to strike.

Soil fertility is most reliably determined by testing it. Proper rates and forms of fertilizer are easily determined from these tests. Avoid the temptation to add that pinch for extra measure!

Depth of planting depends on particular situations. Mostly bulbs are planted with 10-12 cm (4-5 in.) of soil over the bulbs. For additional anchorage in windy locations, this depth can be increased to 15-20 cm (6-8 in.) or perhaps even slightly deeper. Realize however that this deeper planting will slow emergence in spring and may delay the blooming period slightly. This may be used to advantage in areas where late frosts may cause damage.

Mulches are very helpful with lilies. Tree boughs and other loose litter are especially beneficial the first winter after planting lilies to help prevent heaving of the soil. Mulches are also beneficial through summer. They preserve moisture and help keep the soil cool, a condition that lilies prefer. In areas with abundant moisture, low ground covers amongst and around the lilies will add to their attractiveness besides aiding them.

Lilies are best planted and divided after the tops have matured in late fall. This provides time for a new set of roots to grow and anchor the bulbs and ready them for the rapid growth that starts so early in the spring. Spring planting is sometimes practiced, but the planting must be done in very early season before much growth of the sprouts is evident. Spring planted bulbs rarely do as well the first season as those planted the fall before.

In areas with cold winters, such as the northern U.S. and prairie Canada, avoid planting lilies in raised planters. They do not survived the severe fluctuations of temperature that such planters experience through our continental winters and few such planters are properly insulated to prevent this from occurring.

Lilies also require a fair amount of space, and will grow away from heat and shade. Therefore when lilies are used in foundation plantings, or against walls and fences, locate them at least 45 cm (18 in.) from the vertical surfaces. This will prevent the lilies from developing in that particularly unsightly fashion of growing out at 45 degrees to the walls they are trying to escape.

Following these few pointers, you will find lilies very easy to grow and immensely satisfying as garden perennials. Their many forms and colours will help make your yard and garden a true showplace. You will be pleased too with the extra attention they will elicit from all who visit or pass by.

NOTES

LILY CLASSIFICATION

The lily genus has been divided into a number of groups or divisions to facilitate its classification. The vast majority of the lilies listed in this catalogue fall into Division I; that being hybrids of the Asiatics. Within this division are three classes, these separating all the asiatics by the placement of their flowers. Class 'a' contains all the upfacing flowered varieties; class 'b' the outfacing; and class 'c' the downfacing. Generally the class 'a' types are very popular, especially with people just beginning to grow lilies. They are very showy in the garden and make very attractive specimens as cutflowers, being widely used for this purpose. Generally, however, because of the fewer flowers on the stems, they do have a shorter flowering season than classes 'b' and 'c'. Class 'b' varieties, carrying more flowers per stem, provide a longer season of colour. These too make good cutflowers and well grown single stems of many varieties make perfect bouquets themselves. Class 'c' lilies carry the most flowers of all, but because the flowers are pendant, they do not have the same initial impact. They do have a much more graceful and aristocratic air about them however, so they make very valuable additions to the perennial border. Massed in groups, they make a very powerful impression, and large baskets of these beauties have a charm unspeakable.

Division II lilies are hybrids of the martagon family. Sometimes called the wheel lilies because their leaves are placed in whorls or 'wheels' around the stem, these lilies bear delightful small downfacing flowers with very waxy substance and recurved petals. This flower form has earned the martagons their other nickname:

the turk's cap lilies.

Division IX will cover the few remaining lilies in this list that do not fit into the previous two divisions. It encompasses the species lilies, their varieties and forms. It is therefore an extremely variable division and describable only as the individual members.

NEW LISTINGS AT HONEYWOOD

'CONNECTICUT KING' la. Stone & Payne. This brilliant yellow upfacing lily has been widely used in hybridization and has been the parent of many lovely lilies. It is also a fine garden lily and we are listing it this year specifically for that purpose. 'Connecticut King' blooms in late mid-season and reaches 90 cm (3 ft.).

'CORINA' la. De Jong. A vigorous upfacing bold red lily that will add to your early season in the lily patch. 'Corina' does not fade as many other red lilies and is spotted brown in the centre of the flower. It grows to 75 cm (2.5 ft.).

'MOUNT BLANC' la. This lily of Dutch origin is a breath-takingly beautiful soft creamy-white with a few spots in the flower centres. It blooms in mid-season on stems that are 60 cm (2 ft.).

'ROCHESTER' la. Another bright red mid-season lily that really stands out in the lily patch because its buds color well before opening, giving a candelabra effect. Mature stems top 90 cm (3 ft.).

'STERLING STAR' la. Oregon Bulb Farms. This lily has become popular very quickly. The white flowers are upfacing and possess a generous sprinkling of fine black spots. While showing a hint of cream close up, 'Sterling Star' make a lovely splash of white in any flower border, and is superior in floral arrangements because of its high bud count.

'CINNAMON TOAST' la. Porter. This creamy-beige lily has a bold dash of fine spots scattered over its face. Older flowers are a clear ivory and as they are born on a pyramidal inflorescence, they make a splendid garden display and a beauty for cutting. It is a vigorous grower to 75 cm (2.5 ft.) and blooms in early mid-season.

'GOLDEN AGE' la. Porter. The rich golden yellow flowers of this variety are amongst the season closers in the Asiatic class. Dark stems accent the flowers and the presence of stem bulbils make it very easy to propagate. 'Golden Age' grows to 90 cm (3 ft.) and because of its late flowering habit, will make a good variety for growing to show at August flower shows.

'SKYDANCER' lc. Porter. This tiger hybrid is the tallest lily we've grown, often reaching 2 meters (6.5 ft.) before the season is through. The downfacing clear yellow brown-spotted flowers can easily be enjoyed because they are born at eye level with most people. It blooms late along with the other tigers, and for all its height, has never shown any wind lodging. 'Skydancer' makes a breath-taking background for other shorter lilies or for other perennials. It will take it two or three growing seasons to reach its maximum height, but has good staying power.

sold out 'AMULET' la. Tarlton. An exciting, lively yellow lily. The inflorescence is extended so that the upfacing blooms come one above the other. 'Amulet' has taken the Best in Show in the Canadian Prairie Lily Society Show. Height 75 cm (2.5 ft.).

'DELICIOUS' la. Porter. This variety is noteworthy for its light but pleasant fragrance, that is especially noticeable in the evening. 'Delicious' received an Award of Commendation at the N.A.L.S Show in 1967. Height 60 cm (2 ft.) Medium orange.

Sold out DESTINY la. deGraaff. This yellow lily is more heavily spotted than 'Golden Wonder' and blooms a bit later in July. Height 45-60 cm (1.5-2 ft.).

'FLAMING GIANT' la. Porter. A vigorous lily facing directly upward. The large cup-shaped blooms flare to show the vivid red-orange colour. It has very good substance, blooms in July and makes an outstanding lily for the back of the border. Height to 120 cm (4 ft.).

'GOLDEN DAURICUM' la. Porter. This is an outstanding dwarf selection. It is a hybrid, but has the Dauricum-type blooms of rich yellow-gold. It blooms early and produces masses of colour in the border after the tulips and irises have finished. Height 45-50 cm (1.5 - 1.75 ft.).

'GOLDEN JUBILEE' la. Porter. Our own upfacing golden-yellow lily. Another good early variety with rich colour and good foliage. Height 60 cm (2 ft.).

'GOLDEN WONDER' la. This lily was sent to Honeywood by a friend many years ago. It is early blooming, in a soft yellow with no spotting. It makes an excellent garden lily and is used extensively here as a cut flower, being so early. Height 60 cm (2 ft.).

'JOLLY MILLER' la. Porter. An outstanding early lily to 60 cm (2 ft.). The substance of the flowers is excellent; colour, a very attractive butter yellow. This is a first quality lily for either cutting or garden display. It makes a good clump quickly and will bloom undisturbed for many years.

'ORANGE LIGHT' la. Porter. One of the most vivid orange lilies in existence. The nearly spotless cup-shaped blooms are almost fluorescent, they glow so brightly. The stems to 75 cm (2.5 ft.) are well clothed with dark green leaves. Award of Merit, 1971.

sold out POLAR BEAR' la. Doerr. This dwarf variety was one of the first whites available. It is still one of the most dwarf and produces several lovely star-shaped blooms in a beautiful cream shade that turns clear white in bright sun. Because 'Polar Bear' multiplies so rapidly, it is necessary to lift and divide the clumps every two years to maintain flower size and quality. But your neighbors won't turn you away when you take some bulbs over to share. Height 45-60 cm (18-24 in.). This variety produces quite small bulbs.

'REDBIRD' la. Palmer. This older variety has continued to perform well at Honeywood. The bold red spotted flowers are borne on sturdy stems to 150 cm. (5 ft)

'RUBY' la. Byam. A good deep red upfacing lily to 60 cm (2 ft.). Similar in colour to 'Firebright'.

bold outSNOWBIRD' la. Tarlton. This snow white lily will thrill you every time you pass by. It produces a candelabra-type head a shining white blooms with contrasting spots. Excellent foliage, strong sturdy plants to 90 cm (3 ft.).

'WHITE PICTURE' la-b. Porter. This white lily has attracted a great deal of attention from visitors to the nursery. It has shown resistance to basal rot. A vigorous plant to 120 cm (4 ft.). Blooms open wide and are lightly fragrant at times. 'White Picture' can open a rich amber colour in cloudy, cool weather. Under prairie conditions it bleaches in the bud.

Sold out APRICOT GLOW' lb. Patterson. A vigorous lily with blooms up to 18 cm (7 in.) across. Colour is bright apricot.

sold ou'BLACK VELVET' lb. Mattas. The rich black-red colour of this variety is novel. Each petal and tepal has a stripe of soft orange running down the nectary for a pleasant contrast. Height 60 cm (2 ft.).

'BRENDA WATTS' lb. Preston. We would rate this as best of the Preston hybrids. It will reach 120 cm (4 ft.). The partly reflexed blooms are a brilliant grenadine-red with dark brown spots. Even after forty years, this lily remains healthy and vigorous.

'BROWN IVORY' lb. Patterson. One of his earlier selections, this one has done well here. An excellent garden lily, the plants grow to 120 cm (4 ft.) and bear tall heads of deep amber, brown spotted flowers.

'BURNISHED ROSE' lb. Patterson. This lily is of a rich rose tint cast over with copper. It is a tall variety to 150 cm (5 ft.).

'CHEERFUL CHARLIE' lb. Porter. A very striking bi-colour; the outer part of the tepals is a rich wine-red, the inner third a creamy yellow that fades to white. The wide open blooms face out and up on 60 cm (2 ft.) stems well clothed with forest green foliage. It lives up to its name, making a cheerful spot where it blooms.

'EARLIBIRD' lb. Porter. This lily, earliest in its class, has flowers of clear vivid apricot with fine dark spots toward the base of the petals. It has shown strong resistance to botrytis and has proven to have staying power, being thirty years old. It is one of the few lily that have the ability to continue doing well even with as many as twenty fist-sized bulbs in one clump. Height 75 cm (2.5 ft.).

'EMBARRASSMENT' lb-c. Simonet. This seeding of Scottiae was obviously pollinated by one of the Patterson hybrids. It grows to 120 cm (4 ft.) or more and bears rich glowing pink flowers. It produces secondary flower buds and we have had stems with as many as fifty blooms on each.

'FIREBRIGHT' lb. Porter. A vivid currant-red lily with spotless flowers forming a well-shaped, pyramidal head. The substance is good and the colour does not fade. It is a good propagator and grows to 60 cm (2 ft.).

'GEISHA GIRL' lb. Porter. This lily resembles 'Lemon Queen', but is more dwarf, reaching only 50-60 cm (20-24 in.). Nice lemony-yellow flowers are borne in rich profusion and make an attractive display.

'HONEYBUNCH' lb. Barber. Spotless open-faced blooms in well formed heads make single stems of 'Honeybunch' into bouquets. The flowers are a rich honey shade overlaid with pink, no spots. Height to 90 cm (3 ft.).

'HONEY QUEEN' lb. Patterson. Growing to 100 cm (3.5 ft.), this delightful lily blooms in a rich honey amber, tipped with rose. It has some self spotting on the basal third of the tepals.

'LADY DAWN' lb. Barber. The funnel-shaped blooms of this variety are deep fuchsia with a sharply contrasting cream throat. It is exceptionally beautiful from the time the rich wine coloured shoots emerge to the fading of the last blossoms. Height 100 cm. (3.5 ft.).

'MELODY' lb. Byam. A very attractive yellow variety that is slow to crowd itself. Height 60 cm (2 ft.).

'ORCHID QUEEN' lb. Patterson. The name of this lily comes from its blossoms, that are of such a colouring as to suggest an orchid. The flowers, up to 12 cm. (5 in.) across, have three colour zones. The outer portion of the tepals is dawn pink, the middle zone is straw yellow and the centre is pale shell pink. The colours merge one into the other. Height to 60 cm (2 ft.).

'PINK CHAMPAGNE' lb. Porter. This tigrinum hybrid fills the space between the July blooming Cernuum hybrids and the August blooming tiger lilies. The blooms are yellow with an overlay of pink. The pink fades out after a day or two, leaving a clear champagne shade. A good lily for August horticulture shows. Height to 120 cm (4 ft.).

'QUINELLA' lb. Hayler. This Australian variety has done fine here. It is an unusual yellow shade carrying a hint of red. Height 90 cm (3 ft.).

'RED VELVET' lb. Stone and Payne. Exceptional substance makes this lily outstanding. Nearly spotless, the mahogany-red flowers are borne on 120 cm (4 ft.) stems.

STROYNAYA lb. This non-registered Russian variety has been extensively used in breeding work. It continues to provide us with very interesting progeny. The flowers are a red-orange, quite well spotted, on stems to $120 \, \mathrm{cm} \, (4 \, \mathrm{ft.})$.

'SUMMER NIGHT' lb. Simonet. A unique lily in that its colour is almost black, actually a very dark black-red. The 120 cm (4 ft.) stems carry as many as twelve very long pedicelled flowers. The colour is fade-proof. A must for all who like the dark ones.

'SUNTAN' lb. Barber. Rich coppery-bronze with a green nectary. Substance is waxy making a fine lily for floral artist and for use indoors in bronze or copper containers. Height 90 cm. (3 ft.).

'BLACK BUTTERFLY' lc. Simonet. Deep red, almost black pendant blooms make this lily the richest in its class. It is very graceful growing to 120 cm (4 ft.). Award of Commendation, N.A.L.S. 1966.

'BRONZE QUEEN' lc. Patterson. This is perhaps the tallest of the Patterson hybrids, reaching 150 cm (5 ft.) or more, with up to thirty or more blooms on a stem. Holds up well to wind. The flowers are an unusual bronzy-yellow.

'GOLDEN PRINCESS' lc. Patterson. This hybrid provides us with one of the richest yellow shades in the lilies and joins 'Quinella' in this unusual yellow colour grouping. 'JASPER' lc. Patterson. This tigrinum hybrid is another of those that seems to have the ability to survive no matter what. Its colour is old rose or jasper, with prominent spotting. Height to 90 cm (3 ft.).

HONEYWOOD PEONIES, MINOR BULBS AND IRISES

Unfortunately, because of difficulties in shipping the following across the international boundary, we regretfully must limit orders of the following to Canadian Customers Only.

HONEYWOOD PEONIES

Peonies hold the stage in the perennial border for about three weeks in late June and early July. Give a second choice as some varieties are limited in quantity. Peonies should be planted in full sun. Do not plant too deeply, 3-5 cm of soil over the crown is about right. Deep planted peonies do not bloom well. Planted too shallow, the crowns can be injured over winter. It's a good practice to mulch the first winter with some loose material such as corn stalks, or straw. Large 3-5 eye divisions.

 $\textbf{ALBERT CROUSSE:} \ A \ lovely \ light \ rose-pink \ double, blooming \ in \ late \ mid-season.$

YUKON BLUE: Iris Setosa: More dwarf than the above, to 30-45 cm. Flowers have narrower purple-blue standards and the white falls are heavily veined in the same bluish shade.

RHAPSODY: An attractive iris in a two-tone shade of blue and purple. 45-50 cm tall. LOVE'S DUET: A pretty combination of white standards and lavendar falls. 45 cm.




HERE IS HOW TO FIND US

Visitors are welcome to Honeywood. We have many beautiful sights at the nursery throughout the year. The flowering of the fruits begins with the plums and cherry-plum hybrids usually toward the end of the first week of May. These are followed by the apples, ornamental crabs and pears. Early June is lilac time, followed by the peonies beginning near the end of the month and running into early July. The first lilies start about that time and bloom through to mid August. The biggest flush of color runs from about the 20th of July to the end of the month, and we are justly proud of our lily fields. The major fruits start ripening from mid August onward and many come to see and sample varieties to help them decide which they will grow.

The nursery is open Monday through Saturday throughout the season. Those wishing to visit on Sunday or coming from distant places, are asked to phone ahead to make an appointment.
